

Collaboration

We began to work together by convening in communities, across state agencies, within public-private sectors to assess data, create a strategic annual plan based on the data, and evaluate the outcome each year.





We bring together at the same table—the social worker, the nurse, the sheriff, the BOE Superintendent, the minister, the business person, the public servant, parents, and community members and then help them to figure out the best way for their children and families to thrive.

27% of Georgia's children live in poverty

Georgia has the 5th worst child poverty rate in the nation.

But Also Today



The number of kids not graduating on time has dropped by 21% in the past decade.



Georgia's teen birth rate has dropped dramatically in the past two decades.

Our Vision

That all children in Georgia are healthy, ready to start school and do well when they get there, that every family is stable and self-sufficient, and that communities are strong.

County Collaboratives

Identify local priorities and needs, manage their own planning process, share resources, and evaluate programs and practices.

County Collaboratives

Hold themselves accountable for results of their work by tracking locally selected indicators of child well-being using KIDS COUNT data. Georgia Family Connection leverages \$5 for every \$1 of state funding.

35% of Georgia's children are obese or overweight.

43% failed to attain a healthy fitness zone.

 boost Georgia's economy.




